


EGYPTIAN MAU NEWSLETTER 2023

Show Matters

The Egyptian Mau Society is affiliated to the Governing Council of the Cat Fancy (GCCF). Therefore, the show dates, where shown, will be for GCCF shows only. You may find a full list of GCCF shows at https://www.gccfcats.org/shows-activities/. In GCCF, Maus meeting the standard of points criteria are shown in Section Four of any ALL BREED or Specialist shows, see the list of shows below. Details of how to show any cat at a GCCF show may be found at https://www.gccfcats.org/shows-activities/shows-events/getting-started/.

For shows that belong to other registries such as TICA, CFA, Fife, etc. please visit their own websites. At the 'other registry' you can enter your cat for any of their shows (aka "cat extravaganza's").

Specialist Egyptian Mau Show Dates for 2023

Egyptian Mau Club – 7th **May**, at a new venue, Perdiswell Leisure Centre, Bilford Road, Worcester, WR3 8DX (just off the M5 jn 6). The show is shared with the Central All Breed cat club, Midland Counties cat club, Progressive Ragdoll Breed cat club. This means that your Mau can enter any **TWO** of the three shows, with the potential of winning TWO certificates (saving on much travel!) and if they're lucky, gain 3 challenge certificates.

Egyptian Mau Society – 29th **July,** at Sports Connexion Leisure Centre, Learnington Road, Ryton on Dunsmore, near Coventry (close to the M40, M42, M6). This show is shared with the Shorthaired cat club and other breed clubs, meaning your Mau can, if they're lucky, get 2 challenge certificates.



Take YOUR cat to a Show!

Taking your cat to a show can be a great experience; it is the chance to learn more about both Egyptian Maus and other cat breeds. You can watch the cats being judged for the top table and see how the judges handle them and what characteristics they are looking for.

The GCCF have a great beginners guide to showing your cat. This guide includes many FAQ's which anyone who is new to showing generally ask, such as:



They should be brushed regularly to help maintain a healthy coat, and you should always keep their eyes clean, and their nails clipped. See our article on Grooming later on.

Titles and Awards

Cat Title:

Champion (CH), Premier (PR) or Mastercat (MC) Grand Champion(GRCH), Premier (GRPR) or Mastercat (GRMC) Imperial Grand Champion (IGCH), Premier (IGPR) or Mastercat (IGMC) Olympian Bronze/Silver/Gold (OB/OS/OG)

Number of Certificates (by different judges) to qualify:

3x Certificates

3x Certificates

5x Certificates

5x Certificates per level with 4 at All-Breed shows

Top Cats, like those featured in Show Cats have won many titles and awards. Titles can be broken down into three categories.

Cats who MEET their breed Standard of Points have a choice of two depending on their status – adult or neuter - are shown in the Pedigree section of a show. Cats which DO NOT meet their breed Standard of Points, are shown in the Household Pet section of a show.

- 1, Cats which are not neutered or altered so are still entire and who are over 9 months of age on Show Day, are called Adults, and they compete for Challenge Certificates.
- 2, Cats which have been neutered and are over 9 months of age on Show Day are called Neuters and they compete for Premier Certificates.
- 3, Cats which DO NOT meet their breeds Standard of Points compete in the Household Pet Section for Mastercat Certificates. Known as Pedigree Pets, these cats must be neutered and over 9 months of age.

During the afternoon at a GCCF show, it's possible to watch the best of the best cats in each section being judged head to head to win overall Best In Show.

At other registries the cats are divided into kitten/adolescents/cat/neuter/pet classes, and owners watch the judging for all classes, and you see the other breeds being assessed on the table too. 'Pet' quality Maus can be entered in the 'Household Pet' section (of most other registries) of the show, but if you're not sure, ask your breeder.

As we've touched upon, the criteria that our cats are judged against is called the Standard of Points. These can be found on the GCCF website at https://www.gccfcats.org/getting-a-cat/choosing/cat-breeds/egyptian-mau/.

The landing page from the link will also give you a profile on the Egyptian Mau, the breeding and registration policies, links to both clubs, as well as the Standard of Points and the Breed Advisory Committee for the Egyptian Maus in GCCF.

The GCCF page https://www.gccfcats.org/wp-content/uploads/2022/02/GuidelinesOnEntering-Shows.pdf explains more about taking your cat to show. Some cats can find the sight of the road and traffic distressing, so you may want to cover their travel carriers with a blanket to diminish the disturbing noise and light. If the journey is more than a couple of hours, you can even stay in a 'pet friendly' hotel - the editor took her two for the first time at the age of five, and despite all the worry, they were beautifully behaved and loved the chance to sleep in the bed...

Grand Champion Fellpurrs Ramasees aka RamiBoy

RamiBoy has been a very important boy for the bronze Egyptian Maus since 2017, as he was a new import for UK bloodlines. He retired this spring after fathering five beautiful kittens with Christine Whitehouse's Bastet. All Patrick's cats live with him all their lives (with a very delux day room!), and Patrick says "so evidently he will stay at home with us (in Essex not far from Maldon). He does not have a favourite toy per say, only, I'm the toy LOL, as soon as I'm around he is on my shoulders and all he wants is cuddles!"

Champion Geniemau Nebula aka Nebs or 'Pickle'

Neb's owners have this to say about her: - "If one of the cats is going to get in a mess for being too playful, silly, or inquisitive, it'll be Nebs... getting herself in a pickle! She was neutered in 2020 and still lives with us. Favourite toy: a hair bobble. Nebs loves a game of hair bobble fetch! Nebs was a very timid cat after an incident with another of our queens, Serenity, but over the years she's become much more comfortable and confident and now regularly cuddles up with the other two, or plays chase with her mum, Lottie."

He will tell you when wants feeding (most of the time), when he wants to cuddle (most of the rest of the time — he ADORES cuddles and will hug our arms into his chest as if we were his teddy!) Although he is neutered, he's quite the ladies' man and is usually found sleeping with the girls when not cuddling us. His favourite toy is "sticky thing" which is the end of any wand toy, which he'll carry around like a dog — with the rest of the cats following the toy on the end. Having had some serious health problems in his life, we're still very lucky to have him with us. He's been on TV, in magazines, a photo shoot, and had a cuddly toy made in his image."

Ancient Egyptian Proverb: Never Laugh at a Cat.

Ancient Egyptians liked to write down stories, poems and letters, providing us with remarkable examples of early African thought. This particular proverb was one of a number that students, lucky enough to be

learning the art of writing, would scribe. They would be set writing exercises and marked by their teacher. Usually this would be in a script called hieratic at first, the hieroglyphs being learnt later, in the same way that children learn to print before cursive script.

These exercises would be done on pottery shards (papyrus being expensive) as would shopping lists and household messages. There were some standard texts for pupils, such as the proverbs like "Never

Laugh At A Cat", others being a father writing instructions to his son, and a teacher writing to his pupil (e.g. Anastasi III text, including "The scribe of superior intellect, with sound advice, over whose speech there is rejoicing...") – which have been found with corrections made by the teacher.

These saying were likely taken from the Instruction of Ankhsheshonq, which he wrote to his young son after he was imprisoned by Pharaoh generally thought to be around the Ptolemaic period:

"You may trip over your foot in the house of a great man; you should not trip over your tongue."

"He who is bitten of the bite of a snake is afraid of a coil of rope."


Flynn, silver, flicked a whole, beautifully cooked duck breast off a plate. Unfortunately for him, my poodle got it. MM on Gooseberry Green.

Egyptian Mau Health Matters - Update on the Urate Stone Study 2023

The study is requesting additional DNA from any cat affected by urate stones, as comparative DNA! **Can you help out**? See the links at the bottom of the article for details.

This in an international Study on the Egyptian Mau breed. Our breed. We have the attention and interest of the highest scientists on the planet who want to help our Maus with this painful condition.

The Study follows on some previous work that proved that Egyptian Maus are far more prone to urate stones than other breeds, and indeed, non-pedigree cats.

Owners with affected Maus, and the Urate Stone study have found enormous support in global Facebook groups. The groups are looking for owners to contribute DNA to the study. There are 203 members.

Recent headline developments are:

- * Antony Nichols, (Member of the GCCF genetics committee) contacted Carolle Fleury,(Global lead, in Canada), to offer his support & interest in the Egyptian Mau urate stone study and in the group.
- * Carolle Fleury is back coordinating the study with owners across the globe (after time away, given she has another Mau with a diagnosis of urate stones).

The purpose of the study on urate stones in Egyptian Maus is to find and isolate the causal gene that causes formation of stones after the ingestion of purines. Somewhere the digestive system decides that it becomes a machine to build urate when high content purine proteins are ingested by our cats - as cats are carnivore beings, there is no way around having purine in their diets. Oddly, there are different levels of urate production in different cats.

Once this gene is identified, a test could be developed to identify the cat(s) that carry that gene. Future generations could become urate stone free, as breeders test their cats, and manage breeding partners to avoid the problem gene.



occurs in your cat's pedigree) would be ideal.

The study is extremely fortunate to have these geneticists:

- * Dr. Leslie Lyons who has accepted to add to her studies the Egyptian Mau cat.
- * Dr. Philippa Lait at Langfords, UK.
- * Dr. Heather Lorimer in Youngstow USA.

Dr. Lyons, I may add, is quite excited about this attempt of moving forward. Let's bombard her with samples! The owners need to supply two blood samples for genome sequencing (comparative detailed sample). As Dr Lyons already obtained JoNatan's DNA (Carolle Fleury's 2nd affected Mau), another sample of an affected cat that is not closely related (Jo is an Emauge cat, you should be able to see if the Emauge name

HISTORY

In ancient Egypt small cats were first domesticated around 4000 years BC and were depicted in their art. Today the Egyptian Mau is a natural breed derived from the modern street cats of Egypt and bears a close resemblance to those ancient cats. The breed as we know it today was initially developed after WW2 in the USA, Canada, Japan, and continental Europe. The first Egyptian Maus were imported to the UK by Professor Melissa Bateson in 1998. The breed was fully recognized by GCCF in 2006.

APPEARANCE

Coat: Medium length, close-lying with a lustrous sheen. In the silver and bronze colours, the hair is dense and resilient. In the smoke colour, the hair is silky and fine in texture.

Body: Slim medium-sized, elegant, well-balanced, strong, solid, and muscular. The medium length head is a slightly rounded wedge without flat planes. Their unique 'worried' look is generated by large, almond shaped eyes set beneath a level brow and on either side of the parallel lines of the nose. Longer hind legs make it seem to stand on tip-toe. A loose skin flap extends from the flank to the knee of each hind leg. Males can be larger in size than females.

Colours: Silver, smoke, and bronze. Maus are characterised by a random spotted pattern seen both in tabby and smoke colours. Eye colour gooseberry green.

The unique build of the Egyptian Mau allows them to run much faster than other domestic cats. They love to fetch and retrieve toys, and many have no fear of water. Affectionate and loving they thrive on human attention and can be very insistent. As they are so inquisitive, they are best kept in pairs or with other animals.

CARE/GROOMING

Enjoys a soft brush for pleasure. Avoid overfeeding. Make sure they have a secure outdoor space and plenty of toys and games for mental stimulation.


POSSIBLE HEALTH ISSUES

Occasionally skin sensitivities may develop which can manifest in itchiness, especially around the head and neck. While other breeds may suffer anaemia from genetically inherited Pyruvate Kinase Deficiency, having genes for this condition does not adversely affect the health of the Egyptian Mau.

YOUR QUICK EASY GUIDE TO A MAU

CUT OUT AND KEEP -

An account of keeping a Stud cat, by David Garwood

Here's a post by David, writing as Bronze Egyptian Maus, back in 2021. Leo features in our list of cats that we are wishing a happy retirement to – I'm sure he's going to be very pampered!

"Without a doubt, one of the most challenging aspects of breeding cats is keeping a stud. It's fairly obvious that they need to be kept separate from the girls to prevent the girls continuously getting pregnant, which is just not healthy. However, that's really the tip of the iceberg...

Once the boys reach maturity, they want to start advertising themselves. Cats don't have fancy bars they can frequent, or internet dating websites they can turn to (well, not that they know about at least, although Leo's services were advertised online!). So instead, they do their own version of 'peacocking.' This involves shouting rather loudly to let any would-be paramour know they are available and spraying their homemade 'brand of perfume' around their boudoir. What's more, when a lady-friend comes to visit, it's important that the cats aren't just dropped in a room together.

When I began, I constructed a cat pen joining onto our utility room via the fan-light window to allow the cats some outdoor time whenever they wanted and limit the damage

caused by Leo's M'Eau de Parfum. The cat pen has an inner and outer section separated by wire mesh and each section has an insulated, wind and Welsh-rain* proof cosy den. This allows Leo and lady-friend to meet and get to know each other in a safe environment until the girl begins to call.

The girls' hormones cycle and they'll usually be ready to meet a boyfriend roughly every 3 weeks between March and October (at least in my experience).

However sometimes even just a change of scenery can upset them and they may stop calling for a while, e.g. immediately after arriving! They might even just not take a fancy to the boy as was the case with Freyja when she visited from Finland. Leo had to put a lot of work in to make any progress over 6 weeks!

Even that was nothing compared to Lottie who took a 12 month vow of celibacy when she left her old home to come and live with us. Honestly, I think she was just very sad to leave her old home and took a while to settle in, but now she's very happy and spends almost every minute in the same room as Leo.

Ch Geniemau Daisy lives 'oop t'North and is the sister of Ch Geniemau Nebula. She came to visit Leo three years ago and was his first of only two visiting lady-friends. If I remember correctly, she skipped a week and had a two-week cycle rather than three which caught us all off-guard and her breeder had to make a quick dash down to us to avoid missing the window of opportunity. I admit I was immensely relieved at how smoothly the whole thing went. Daisy settled into her section of the cat pen immediately and I spent some time sat with her keeping her company. The following day, Leo and Daisy met and stayed together happily until Daisy was collected about a week later. It really doesn't get any easier than that!

Uncle Morse is a neutered male and these can often be great companions to a litter as we found with Leo once he was neutered. Uncle Morse is a bit of a superstar himself and has worked as a cat model a few times! Grand Champion Missy Mau remains an active queen and currently lives in Barnsley with her boyfriend and active stud Gr Ch Sechem Phoenix (from Sophie Marchand in France, the only bronze entire boy in the UK). Linus and Pepi have both gone to their forever homes as neutered pets.

As I've mentioned a few times, occasionally things don't go smoothly and Pepi was fought extremely hard for to give him a chance in life which proved totally worth the effort. A sign of a good breeder is someone who will fight for each life regardless of the cost so long as it's in the best interest of the cat. Despite it being Daisy's first litter and a true baptism of fire, Pepi is now 2 years old and fighting fit and Daisy is still a healthy active queen; all a testament to the resolve, commitment and moral fibre of Daisy's owners.

Let's talk Grooming...

Egyptian Maus are relatively easy to groom. Unlike some breeds of cat, more noticeably the longhaired or semi longhaired varieties, cats which have short, straight fur do not, as a general rule, require hours upon hours of grooming each week. There are some short haired cats which do need more maintenance then others, those which fall into the British category

who have very thick and dense, plush fur, however Egyptian Maus are classified as a Foreign breed and will not require this level of dedication.



However grooming isn't just about making sure your cat looks physically at their best it's also a way to interact, bond and play with your cat — it should be a gentle pleasurable 'me' time for both of you, both relaxed and happy and content in each other's company — rather than the determined wrapping of your cat in a large bath towel while you detangle a knot of fur from their back, clean their ears, clip their claws or remove a bit of muck from their eyes.

Regular, short, productive grooming sessions will become a pleasure for both of you (treats and small rewards can be offered if necessary), so let's proceed from there.

The breed standard for Egyptian Maus states the following: "Hair is of medium length, close-lying with a lustrous sheen. In the silver and bronze colours, the hair is dense and resilient in texture and accommodates two or more bands of ticking separated by lighter bands. In the smoke colour the hair is silky and fine in texture." From the standard we can therefore determine that though Maus do indeed enjoy being groomed,

the slightly resilient (slightly rough and a tiny bit springy) texture to their coat is required, you're not looking to produce a puffball by the time you've finished.

General grooming

The coat. Unless dire circumstances make it necessary you should never need to bath your Egyptian Mau. Hand grooming (stroking) or using a soft brush, gentle comb, or chamois should be all that's necessary to keep your cats coat looking good. You'll only need to do this once a week as Maus are fastidious about their coats and fully able to keep it clean themselves. As mentioned in the previous paragraph however, smoke coloured Maus have a slightly

different texture and feel to their coat and will probably thank you for a tiny bit more attention in this area as they tend to moult slightly more than the silvers do in general.

Ears

Check your cats' ears for signs of wax once a week by very gently bending them back a tiny way. The cat won't particularly like this and you have to be very careful as cats' ears are delicate. If you find wax deposits they can be very carefully removed by a little warm water on the end of a cotton bud. Do this with care and take your time. If you see anything you're not sure of, visit your vet immediately.

Eyes

All cats get a tiny bit of dark coloured dirt and build-up at the corner of their eyes from time to time. These can be removed by warm water on a small piece of cotton wool. Patience and care may be required to remove some very dried bits. If you see any discharge in or around your cats' eyes, visit your vet for a check-up as soon as you can.

Nose

As a general rule of thumb, you shouldn't need to touch your cat's nose (one of their most sensitive organs) for any reason. If your cat has a runny nose, again a vet's visit is advised to see if they've picked up an allergy or have hay fever.



Mastercat Samsonite – is a good example of a Pedigree Pet. Both his parents were full Egyptian Mau, but as he lacked the 'spotting gene' and has a classic, he could not enter the pedigree section of a show. Instead, he entered the Household Pet section and has achieved the rank of Mastercat (so far) which is equivalent to Champion or Premier in the pedigree section.

Claws

Cutting a cat's claws can be a rather tricky and delicate business. Unless started from a very early age, most cats will not willingly give you their paws or allow you to cut their claws. A good pair of clippers are essential, as is the trust of your cat. And a great amount of care is needed to ensure that you never trim the claw too much. You MUST only cut the clear part of the nail – the pink bit which follows is full of nerves and will bleed for a long time; you'll cause your cat extreme pain and will destroy a lot of the trust you've build up. It's always advisable to take less off then more. Most vet surgeries will offer a claw clipping service for very little money and if you're unsure at all about cutting your cats claws yourself, take your cat to them. Otherwise choose a time when the house is quiet and calm and have your cat sitting comfortably on your lap. You should try spreading their paws out gently first to show there is nothing to fear before going any further, and gradually build up their trust.
